Student work produced in Science


Here is some of the work produced by **Sophia Badocha** in Science recently.

Message from Year 9 RSL

This has been an important year for students as they begin to get ready to start their GCSE journey. We are less than 3 months away from some students beginning new courses such as Business Studies and Child Development.

At the moment, the core subjects Maths, Science and English remain high on everyone's priority list so please read below for more information on some of things they are currently working on.

HAP students

Ms Tangi has been working with a number of our high attaining students (HAPs) in year 9 during form time.

In order to help them achieve the top grades, each of the students has been given extra space and time to work on their weaknesses based on the feedback from their classroom teachers or subject MBMs.



English, Maths and Science

In English lessons, students are currently reading "The Small Island". Similarly as to how it is done in KS4, students are expected to learn the plot of the story and consider the themes represented by all the key characters.

In Science lessons, students are being encouraged to use their science skills to be able to identify variables and write up methods in a way that is appropriate also in KS4.

In Maths lessons, students in the foundation classes are currently working on calculating averages from different statistical diagrams while students in the higher classes are currently working on finding the equation of a straight line.

Student work produced in Textiles

In year 9 Textiles, students have been developing their practical skills and pattern cutting.

Each student has created 6 designs and created a final outcome of a pair of shorts. The techniques they focused on were Tie-Dye and hand embroidery. They have 10 weeks to complete their product.

Literacy Intervention



Year 9 have been working towards an Entry Level Certificate for the AQA - Step up to English qualification.

They have also been developing their speaking and listening skills in the form of debates and round table discussions to plan theoretical school events.
